RESEARCH QUESTIONS

Main question: "How does participation in GCI in the Dutch cities of Arnhem & Nijmegen influence the social health of participants?"

- SQ1: How does participation in GCI take place?
- SQ2: What does involvement bring participants regarding social health?



THEORETICAL FRAMEWORK

- Participation ladder in green initiatives
- Measuring social health using Keyes' dimensions of social well-being (Keyes, 1998)

Setting: Green citizen initiatives in Arnhem & Nijmegen situated in lower SES neighbourhoods (N=8).

SQ1: How does **participation** in GCI look like?

Who participates in GCI?

Factors affecting participation:
Age, gender, employability, SES

How do they participate?

Frequency, Length, Roles in GCI

Level of participation

Decide, self-organisation, influence, finance, volunteering, user/consumer (Salverda & Dam, 2008)

SQ2: *What does involvement bring participants regarding social health?*

Measuring Social health (Keyes, 1998)

- Social integration
- Social acceptance
- Social contribution
- Social actualization
- Social coherence

Main RQ: *"How does participation in (urban) Green Citizen Initiatives in the Dutch cities Arnhem & Nijmegen influence the social health of participants?"*



METHODS

QUESTIONNAIRE (N= 98)

- Tested by language ambassadors + Pre-tested
- **Topics:** living environment participants, physical-, mental- and perceived health, demographic questions, participation in the initiative
- SPSS, descriptive analysis

INTERVIEWS (N=16)

- **Topics:** participation in the initiative, meaning, community & organizational assets, future involvement in GCI.
- On location: 12, by telephone: 4
- Average time: 20 minutes
- Coding, thematically described

Results: *Research Sample*

Average age: 55

Gender: 70% female,
29% male

Place of birth:
Majority Dutch (88%)

Participants of 8
different GCI in
Arnhem & Nijmegen
N = 98

Educational level: Higher
educated (52%), MBO/VBMO
31%, lower educated (17%)

Occupation: largely non-
workers (80%)

Economic indicators: not
indicating lower SES

Results: what does participation in GCI look like?

- Length and frequency of participation
- Activities in GCI
- Roles in the initiative:
 - Initiator
 - Coordinator
 - Volunteer
 - User/ Consumer



Results: what does involvement bring participants regarding social health?

- Themes categorized underneath Keyes dimensions of Social health (1998).
- Extra category created





Feeling part of the initiative

Being part of society (again)

"It gives you a certain rhythm, because I am looking for a job at the moment, so I have a lot of time left.. and it is good for structure"

Feeling home in the neighbourhood

Social integration

Quality of someone's **relation to the community and society** (Keyes, 1998). The way people feel like they **belong to a certain community** (Keyes, 1998)



Social contribution

The evaluation that you are **valuable** as a member of society (Keyes, 1998)

Doing something useful for society

"I currently don't work, my husband works, and then you just want to feel useful... I can't just sit at home and only do the household and some crafting. You want to mean something more, for society"

Feeling useful

"That I do something useful, not only for me, but also for others in society here"



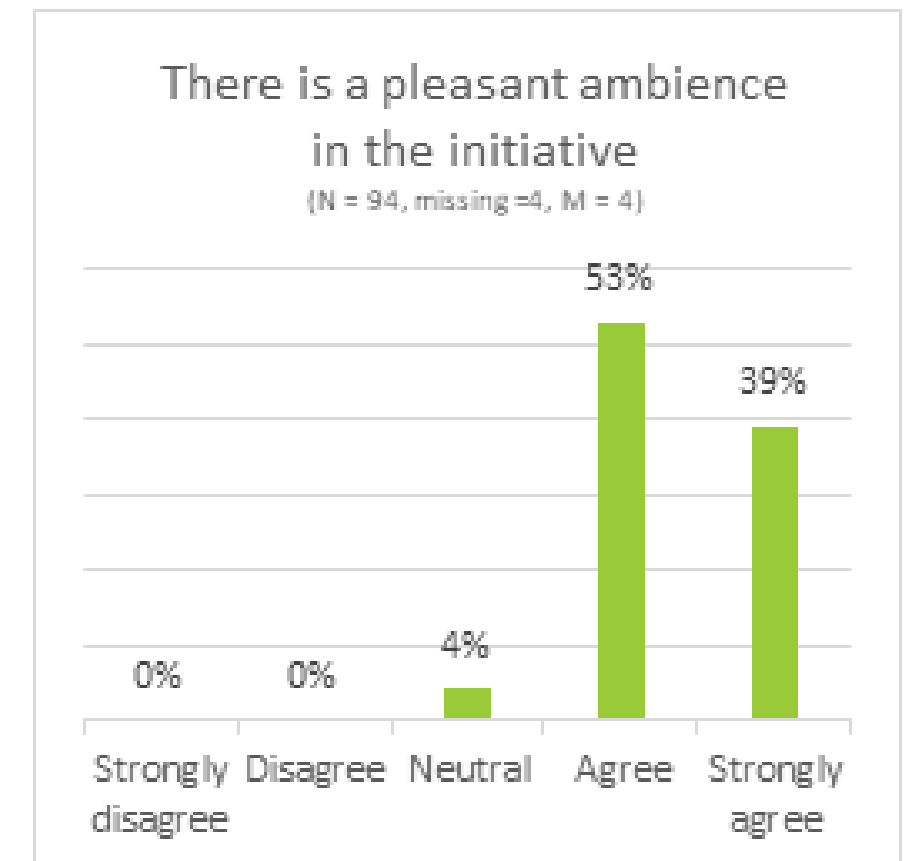
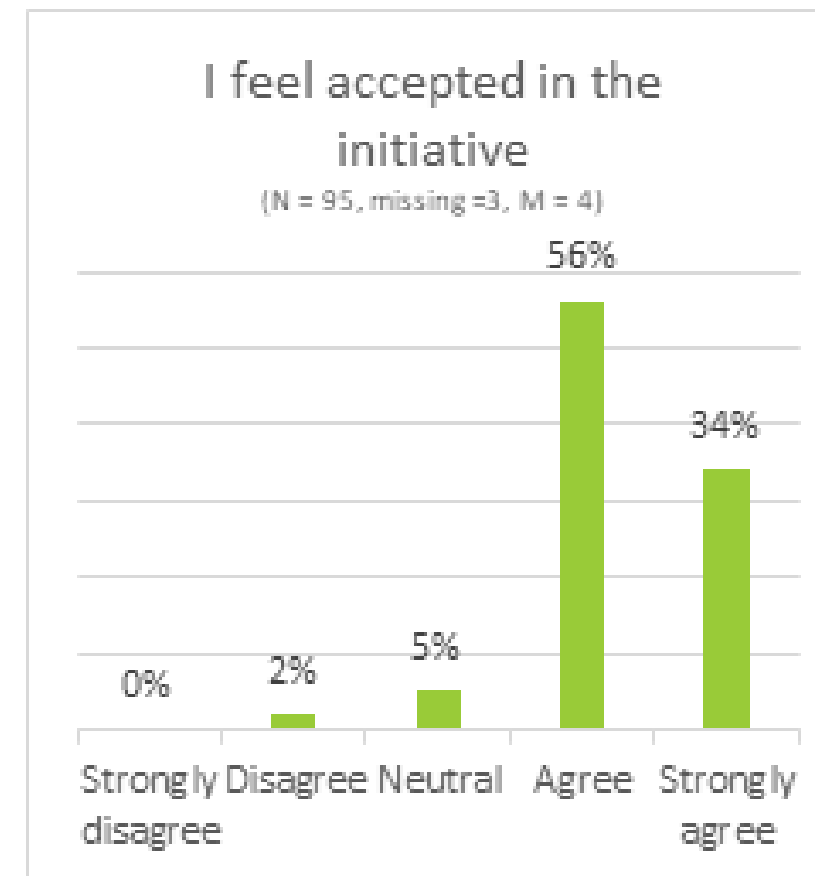
Being accepted by others

“Everybody can just be themselves, and is welcome” [...] “I feel home here, and appreciated because who I am and what I do”

To feel welcome and "home"

Social acceptance

The feeling that others are **capable of kindness**, and in general, **feeling comfortable with others** (Keyes, 1998)





Stimulation, challenges and learning in GCI

Learning practical skills

Harvesting, using machines, sewing and knowledge about plants..

Social learning

·"Here you don't just learn with plants, but you really learn a lot: making contact,.. making plans.. There is a possibility that you get here that gives a push forward, a push to you to make everything in a good way"

Social actualization

- Perception of society having potential, realized through citizens or institutions
- Feeling potential for personal growth and development (Keyes, 1998)



Social coherence

- Referring to a **meaningful and coherent** viewing of the world, and a concern for knowing about the world

Not found back



Other: *Social contact within the initiative*

Meeting new people

- "Normally I was just working, I went to work, went home, cooking, you know those routine things. Now I also have this as an extra place to go and meet more people"

Building a social network

- "You just know each other"

Helping each other
