BIRDS OF A FEATHER FLOCK TOGETHER - RIGHT INTO SCIENTISTS' NETS

All pet owners will happily explain to you their dog or cat's character traits -- probably in far more detail than you ever wanted to know. But the idea of animal personality is not one that's been formally studied all that much. A new study has classed a species of bird into groups of more and less aggressive males. Researchers gauged the response of male collared flycatchers to female birds, to a strange object, and to other males. They found that each type of individual displayed consistent behaviour in each of these situations.

However, they also found that the birds more likely to take risks also were the ones most likely to be trapped -- and thus studied further -- raising important questions about the skewed sample set presented when researchers base their findings on animals caught in traps. It's kind of like when talk show hosts say "95 percent of 13-year olds (who responded to our online survey) are smoking pot!!!" -- leaving out the part about it really being 95 percent of the particular 20 teenagers who felt like responding to our survey.

Wild Animals, Charting the Pathways of Disease" from the New York Times, when the
natural habitats of a species is disturbed the resultant stress on their immune systems

another way that the disturbance and loss of wild places may 4 an impact on
human health.
Studies of bat viruses by researchers such as Jonathan H. Epstein of the EcoHealth
Alliance and Dr. Plowright of the Center for Infections Disease Dynamics, have indicated
that in a natural 5 , bats spread viruses to each other over and over. In an
undisturbed ecosystem this helps the bats build their immune defences.
When however, the native wild habitat of a species is replaced with cities and suburbs,

excrete in their waste. In a new environment, the virus-rich bat waste is 7 to
new "naïve immune systems" that are unable to fight the virus. This can lead to




Figure 1. Mobile device usage among teenagers and adolescents in 2016, by age group and percentage of people using a specific device. Source: CBS (edited)




Figure 2. Time spent on online activities on mobile device among teenagers and adolescents in 2016, in percentages. Source: CBS (edited)

Sample answer task 3:

In order to examine the mobile device use among young people, I designed a survey in which I included questions on the use of various different of devices and the amount spent on different types of online activities. The questionnaire was filled in by 60 teenagers (12-18 years old) and 60 adolescents (18-25 years old).

The results of the survey show three striking findings. First of all, adolescents use smartphones and laptops more than teenagers do. Secondly, teenagers seem to use their mobile devices much more for playing games than adolescents. Additionally, adolescents tend to use their mobile devices much more for reading news articles.

For future research it would be worthwhile to investigate the use of mobile devices by other age groups like younger children and adults to find out more about how people's behaviour changes in the course of a lifetime.


